6 000 reclaimers transporting **150Kg** of waste a day means roughly **1.5** million tons of waste being directed out of landfills.



Johannesburg has an estimated network of **6 000** reclaimers.



With the help of reclaimers, South Africa recycles around **60%** of recyclable materials, on par with global trends in **2017**.

(global trends for 2017: Europe, 45%; UK, 43%; United States, 35.2%)

Reclaimers collect an average of about **100-150 kg** of waste a day.



This is equivalent to roughly **1** baby elephant.



WHAT YOU CAN DO:

A Allow reclaimers access to recyclables.

B **DRY:** plastic bottles, paper, cardboard, glass, metal.



Clearly label any medical waste or dangerous waste you might have.



C Request your Resident Association to meet up with reclaimers in your area.

Sort your RUBBISH BETWEEN

WET: food scraps, food-tainted items, paper napkins, nappies, polystyrene containers.



WET rubbish means all items that are organic, including: food items (cooked or uncooked), teabags, eggshells, cooking oil, tissues, paper towels.

D Remember the 3 'Rs' : Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Use your food-scrap to make a compost.

Reclaimers recycle **70-80%** of household goods.



Reclaimers have provided a free recycling service for a very long time. It is time to recognize their invaluable contribution.



Reclaimers save local authorities up to **R750 million** annually in landfill costs.
